Welcome to School To Go and today's lesson!

Introduction

- 3. Use simple sentences to describe the monkey's actions (e.g., "The monkey jumps!").

Great job! Now you're ready for the song.

Just Listen and enjoy the song and music

Let's listen to "Monkey See, Monkey Do." As you listen, focus on the words and actions the song describes. Imagine what the monkeys are doing, but there's no need to sing or move. Just relax, listen carefully, and enjoy picturing the playful monkeys in your mind.

After the Song

Now that we've listened to the song, let's review the 10 new words we learned. Think about what they mean in your language and how we used them in the song:

- 1. Monkey a playful animal
- 2. See to look
- 3. Do to act or copy
- 4. Jump to leap into the air
- 5. Clap to put your hands together
- 6. Swing to move back and forth
- 7. Balance to keep steady
- 8. Climb to go up something
- 9. Run to move quickly
- 10. Smile to show happiness

Now it's time to complete a few tasks and reflect on what we've just learned.

Work tasks

- 1. Drawing Task: Draw a monkey doing your favorite action from the song. Maybe it's jumping or swinging! Label the action in English.
- 2. Acting Task: With a partner, act out the song. One of you can be the monkey, and the other can copy the actions.
- 3. Movement Task: Choose your own actions and teach your friends a new version of "Monkey See, Monkey Do!"

Once you have completed the tasks, this episode will end.

Here starts the ideas for teachers:

Ideas for the teacher

- 1. Use Visual Aids: Create simple visuals or flashcards that show the different actions from the song, like jumping, clapping, or swinging. Hold them up as cues during the song so the students can see the action before doing it. This will help visual learners connect the word with the action.
- 2. Interactive Movement:
 - As the song plays, encourage the students to stand up and move around the classroom, copying the monkey's actions. For example, when the song says, "jump," everyone should jump, or when it says, "clap," everyone claps together. This will keep the energy high and help kinesthetic learners engage through movement.
- 3. Vocabulary Matching Game:
 - After learning the 10 new words, play a matching game. Write the words on cards and have matching action pictures. Students can work in pairs to match the action word with the correct picture. This is a great way to reinforce vocabulary while having fun.
- 4. Word Review Circle:
 - Stand in a circle with the class and throw a soft ball to one student. When they catch the ball, they say one of the action words (e.g., "jump") and everyone must do the action together. This game keeps everyone alert and practicing their new vocabulary in a fun and active way.
- 5. Create Your Own Song Verse: Challenge students to come up with new verses for the song. For example, instead of "Monkey jumps," they could say, "Monkey dances," and the class must dance along. This allows students to apply what they've learned and be creative.
